1st AKIS Coordination Group Meeting – 13.12.2023

Department of Agriculture, Food & the Marine, Backweston Campus, Celbridge, Co. Kildare

Introduction:

Corina Roe and Karl Walsh, Department of Agriculture, Food and the Marine (DAFM), welcomed attendees and offered brief introductory remarks on AKIS, and the establishment of an AKIS coordination group in Ireland. The group will form part of the formal national consultative structure put in place to promote and support AKIS development in the context of CAP and Food Vision 2030 implementation and monitoring in Ireland. As set out in Ireland's CAP Strategic Plan (CSP), the Irish AKIS is required to become more collaborative, to adapt the AKIS approach to meet key challenges and threats, and to develop a new and improved organisational approach.

The Coordination Group will bring together a significant number of actors in the fields of Agriculture and Rural Development, Science and Research, Education and Communications, and provide a platform to improve synergies and complementarities on knowledge and innovation between institutions.

The chair introduced each of the speakers, who represent their organizations on the Steering Committee for the AKIS Coordination Group.

Speakers & Presentations:

Patrick Barrett (DAFM - Research & Codex Division) - AKIS Overview

- The presentation outlined the need to move knowledge much more quickly from research to end user. This should be target specific.
- Ireland is well structured and interactive. There is a high level of collaboration and coordination already, for example:
 - Knowledge Transfer (KT) activities, CPD for advisors, LEADER, National CAP Network, Research (DAFM & other)
 - AKIS coordination group will bring this all together.

Mark Gibson (Teagasc) - Teagasc & Modern AKIS

- The presentation outlined the Teagasc Structure
 - Advisory Research Education Corporate services
- Research transitions through demo farms and discussion groups.
- Signpost programme is significant development.
- Teagasc ConnectED for Agri-food professionals.
- Modern AKIS project €10m over 7 years. 37 partners, all within Member States. The project aims to connect the AKIS coordination groups of all Member States.

Breian Carroll (Agricultural Consultants' Association) – the work of the ACA

- The presentation outlined the significant role played by the ACA in Ireland's AKIS:
 - 52% of KT groups,
 - 80% of TAMS applications,
 - 76% of Nutrient Management Plans,
 - 58% of BISS applications.
- Outlined the gap in support for farmers, with 35,000 active farmers without either a public or private advisor supporting them.
- Gave an overview of the limitations in funding for the private market, and the innovative adaptations the ACA are making to respond to the needs of the client, including climate smart advisors, EIP leadership, dedicated forestry and organic advisors, among other new approaches.

David Murphy (CAP Network Ireland) - National CAP Network

- CAP Network Ireland is a partnership between Irish Rural Link, ERINN Innovation, and Munster Technological University.
- Involved in research & innovation projects e.g. Knowledge and dissemination tasks.
- Past services provided and expertise include:
 - Advice to research grant applicants
 - Knowledge transfer e.g. EPA
- The Network will apply their process to outputs from DAFM or EU-funded projects, to explore how best to use knowledge from project final reports and create impact pathways for dissemination.

Stephanie Vella, (EU CAP Network) - AKIS Monitoring & Evaluation

- The EU CAP Network is offering relevant activities to EU Member States through their helpdesk to support CSP implementation (including on AKIS assessment).
- Recently undertook a capacity building exercise for Ireland to reflect on the CSP process for development of the AKIS modernisation section.
- The outcomes of this exercise were presented, highlighting the good connectivity of the Irish AKIS, as well as the opportunities for better and faster dissemination.

Cormac McGann (DAFM - CSP Division)- AKIS Coordination Group Terms of Reference

- Presented the draft Terms of Reference for the AKIS Coordination Group.
- Members were invited to submit their views on the Terms of Reference via written procedure by 1 January 2024.
- It was emphasised that the membership of the overall AKIS Coordination Group, and the Steering Committee, were not fixed. Nominees for either group were welcome, from all those attending.

Preparatory Workshop:

- Following a 10-minute networking break, the final hour of the meeting comprised an interactive workshop.
- The purpose of the workshop was to develop a participatory and interactive approach amongst the coordination group members.
- The objective of the workshop was to:
 - Map out key actors in the AKIS network;
 - Identify strengths and weaknesses of the current AKIS strategic approach or key initiatives that participants are engaged in that contribute to the Irish AKIS;
 - Identify key issues and challenges that concern Coordination Group members that should be considered in a work programme for the AKIS Coordination Group.
- Attendees were split into five groups, and the following questions were put to each group:
 - 1. Who are the key actors in the AKIS network?
 - 2. Identify strengths and weaknesses of the current AKIS strategic approach or key initiatives that you are engaged in that contribute to the Irish AKIS.
 - 3. Identify key issues and challenges that concern you as a Coordination Group member that should be considered in a Work Programme.
 - 4. Who do you need to engage with to enhance knowledge uptake for you organisation or your stakeholders?
 - 5. What innovation activities would you like to undertake?

An overview of the outputs of these workshops is outlined in Annex 1 to this meeting report.

Closing Remarks:

During the final session of the meeting, each facilitator provided a brief summary of workshop outputs from their group to the plenary, before the Chair gave closing remarks. The next steps for the Group is to agree a draft work programme, based on the feedback in the workshops held at this meeting. The next meeting of the AKIS Coordination Group will be held in 2024, with a specific date TBC.

Annex 1: Overview of outputs from workshop sessions

1.1 Overview of identified stakeholders

The AKIS Coordination Group members identified a long list of potential stakeholders with whom the group should engage. These included possible key contacts across the following nine areas:

- Governmental Organisations, agencies and Departments
- Advisory services and semi-public agencies
- Farm Bodies and representative groups for farmers
- Non-Governmental Organisations, including environmentally-focused groups
- Rural Communities and representative groups
- Industry, particularly agricultural industry, but also secondary stakeholders
- Education and Research
- Local and National Media, as well as online media, including influencers.
- Other Bodies (General Public, Private Veterinarians, other such groups that are not easily categorized above)

Many specific nominations to the AKIS Coordination Group were suggested, and the Steering Committee will follow up with these to seek nominees to the wider Group.

1.2 Identified Strengths

The AKIS Coordination Group identified many key strengths that can be leveraged in improving the Irish AKIS, including:

1.3 Identified Weaknesses

The AKIS Coordination Group identified many key weaknesses that threaten the impact of the Group, and could be opportunities for improvement, including:

1.4 Key Issues

When asked to identify key issues, the AKIS Coordination Group had many suggestions. Some of the more popular or repeated suggestions are listed below:

AKIS needs better attention on focused innovation, and real change
Groups need to be empowered to impact change
AKIS needs better coordination
There is a lack of geographic tailoring of activities
There needs to be better management of time investment for training farmers
Effective farmer engagement should be prioritised.
There is a risk that group recommendations won't be embraced by government authorities/competent
bodies, or by farmers/users.
Need to define and quantify priority areas, and hard to reach farmers and plan how to engage
Schemes are not levers for all subsectors, there are other drivers CSP/ESG/consumers
